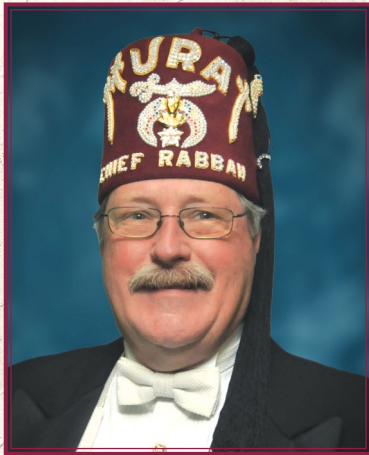

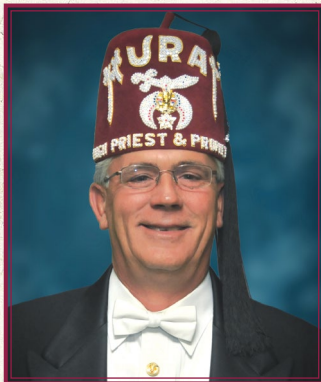
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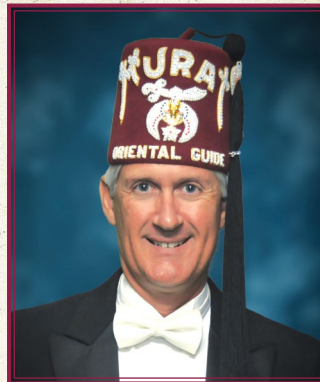

To that end, here is some fraternal advice on maximizing the enjoyment of your Shrine experience:

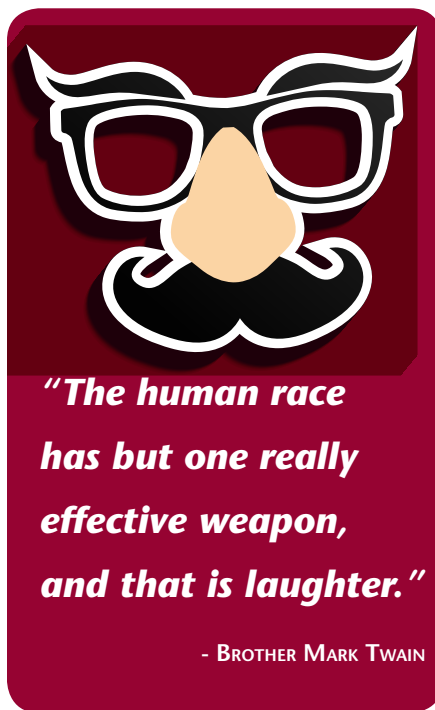
- Laugh at yourself freely, and make others laugh often

Craig Trent Hinshaw, P.P.

Craig Trent Hinshaw was the oldest of four children and the only son of Herman and Ruth Hinshaw. Born in Noblesville, IN, he lived in nearby Lapel and moved to Indianapolis when his father took a job at Ben Davis High School. He attended Shortridge High School in Indianapolis. After high school graduation, Craig spent two years in Flint, MI, with a mechanical engineering curriculum before transferring to IU in Bloomington where he graduated with a B.A. degree in chemistry. Craig attended Butler University for a graduate degree in chemistry.

He started his career at the Indiana State Department of Health in 1963 as a bench chemist in the Environmental Laboratory and he retired as the director of the chemistry laboratories, which included environmental, food chemistry, industrial hygiene, and the radiochemistry laboratories. He managed chemists who were involved with public health programs and concerns in Indiana. After 45 years of public health service in Indiana, he retired in July 2008.

Six months after joining the staff at the State Department of Health, Craig was called to serve a tour of duty in the United States Army, assigned to a medical unit. After his military obligation was completed, Craig and his wife, Kay, who grew up in Michigan City and graduated from IU, met at the Department of Health where Kay worked in Public Health Dentistry.

After 23 years, Kay retired from the VA hospital in May 2008, two months before Craig's retirement. They were married in 1968 and had three sons, Trent, Matthew and Mark, who graduated from Purdue University and married Purdue girls. Craig also loved spending time with his five grandsons and three granddaughters.

Craig was born into a family with a Masonic background—both his father and grandfather were Shriners.

Craig became a Master Mason at Millersville Lodge #126, where he was raised on March 30, 1965, and received his 32nd degree in the 1965 winter centennial class at the Scottish Rite. He crossed the Hot Sands at the Murat Shrine in the winter class of 1965 and became a member of the Prather York Rite in September of 2005. He served as Murat Shrine Potentate in 2010 and was proud that his three sons were also members of the Scottish Rite and Murat Shrine, making them fourth generation Shriners.

With the idea of family, fraternity and philanthropy in the life of a Shriner, family was always a priority with Craig. He was very involved with his three sons' education and sporting events. He traveled with his sons to swim meets all over the United States and in Canada. Craig volunteered as a U.S. swim official at meets for nearly 20 years, relinquishing that duty when his youngest son graduated from high school in 1995. Craig and Kay were members of Chapel Rock Christian Church.

Murat's Reception Unit was the first Shrine unit that Craig joined, serving as president in 2002. Craig served on the Board of Governors for the Chicago Shriners Hospital from 2004–2014 and was a member of Kentucky Colonels, Mobil Nobles, Firemen's Club, Police Club, Directors Staff, Kowad 'al Sabikin, Order of the "Q," Yacht Club, Hillbillies, Knights of St. Andrew, and Highlanders. He was also involved in the degree work at the Scottish Rite convocations and the York Rite classes.

In 2004, he was appointed to the position of Outer Guard by Illustrious Potentate Barry Cook. He was active in the Divan coordinating the ceremonials, serving on the membership committee, budget committee, personnel committee, Oasis Events committee, and helped to coordinate the annual leadership seminar.

He Wanted to Do His Best – That Was Dad

Previous articles have described why men have become and remained Master Masons and Shriners. In each case, Shriners Hospitals have been one of the strongest reasons for those men to be Shriners.

Many good things have been said about the outstanding qualities of Craig Hinshaw, Past Potentate of Murat Shriners. This article will specifically describe the energy and commitment he gave Shriners Hospital for Children-Chicago.

When I asked Craig in 2004 if he would be interested in serving as an Associate Member of the Board of Governors of Shriners Hospital for Children-Chicago, he gave it due consideration, then said he would be very interested. He did not take the matter lightly; he wanted to know he could be helpful in that role. He served as Associate Member until he became a full member in January 2012. As a member of the Board of Governors, he served on important committees and used experience he had gained from the Indiana State Board of Health to benefit our hospital.

On hospital board meeting days, Craig's day usually began with a 6 a.m. departure from home and he often arrived home after 10:30 p.m. Even while serving as a member of the Murat Divan, including his year as Potentate, he regularly



attended board meetings. He became very close friends with many members of the Board of Governors, including Roger Weaver and John Hall, both of whom are Past Potentates of Mizpah Shriners in Fort Wayne.

Our trips to Chicago, which later included George Clark as an Associate Member, then even later Bob Wilson as an Associate Member, involved long discussions of the hospital. Craig enjoyed those conversations, and added much to the interchanges.

Craig called me in October 2014 to tell me he had decided to submit his resignation from the Board of Governors. He

was quite emotional because he did not want to leave the board, but he knew his health was deterring him from full participation. At the funeral home, I mentioned that phone conversation to his son Trent. Trent said, "Yes, he felt if he couldn't do his best, he should resign and give someone else an opportunity to serve. That was Dad."

Shriners Hospitals for Children® is a pediatric healthcare system of 22 hospitals dedicated to improving the lives of children by providing specialty care, innovative research and outstanding teaching programs. Children up to age 18 with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate are eligible for care and receive all services in a family-centered environment, without regard to the patients' ability to pay. Shriners Hospitals for Children relies on the generosity of donors to deliver this mission every day.

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Murat Kentucky Colonels Shrine Club

It all began in 1956. Who would have thought what happened so long ago would eventually lay the foundation for the Murat Kentucky Colonels Club. As we celebrate our 25th year as a club, it only seems appropriate that we start from the beginning; but as I said, the beginning was actually in 1956 or 59 years ago. How do we come up with our 25-year anniversary? Let me explain.

Kenny Kinman, who was not yet a Shriner or a Kentucky Colonel, was in Winchester, KY, on business. At the conclusion of their business, Kenny and his boss went to his boss's father's house that just happened to be next door to a man named Albert "Happy" Chandler. Now for those not old enough to remember that name, let me bring you up to speed. Albert "Happy" Chandler was the commissioner of Major League Baseball, then a U.S. senator, and eventually the governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

A big party was underway when they arrived and during the course of the evening, Kenny was introduced to Happy Chandler. During one of their conversations throughout the evening, Happy asked Kenny if he was a Kentucky Colonel and Kenny said no. Happy said wait just a minute and went over to his aide and about three minutes later, Happy swore Kenny in as a member of the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels. What a party as the Zem-Zem flowed.

Colonel Kenneth Kinman, as he is now known, joined Murat Shrine shortly after that. A few years passed when Kenny met with Past Potentate Glenn Speckman who suggested Kenny form a club consisting of Shrine members who were also Kentucky Colonels. In 1990, the Club became a reality and 12 Shriners from Murat, with the permission of the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels, formed the Murat Kentucky Colonels Club. Word got out and at the first actual meeting, the officers were elected and 60 Shriners joined the Club. What a start!

The mission at that time was a social club, which assists at Shrine functions, participates in the circus activities, takes trips to scenic places, attended several meetings and gatherings at Bardstown, KY, Churchill Downs, and rode the Belle of Louisville. The original by-laws were written by Earl

Moore and Kenny and were followed for more than 20 years until they were amended in 2014.

Not much has changed since those early days. The Club has had many members come and go throughout the years and the mission has changed somewhat, but the requirements for membership remain the same. To join our Club you must already be a member of the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels and be recommended by a Club member. Our official dress is a white suit, string tie, black shoes, fez and a smile, but the white polo shirt with a Colonels logo, Colonels jacket, and black pants are the norm.

In 1998, the Club decided to take on as its mission sponsorship of the annual Screening Clinic for children with orthopaedic problems and burn injuries. Since then several hundred local children have been admitted to our Shriners Hospitals for Children via the Screening Clinic. In addition, the Club informs the public about our hospital program at our Murat Shrine Circus and various other functions during the year including the annual Paper Crusade. Although the clinic is no longer being conducted, the Club participates in several temple sponsored programs and charities. The Club became a participant in Shrine parades in 2013 in order to advertise our hospitals and we continue to parade to this day.

Several Colonels, both past and present, have gone on to serve and represent Murat in many ways. Just to name a few are Past Potentates Colonels Glenn Speckman, George Proctor, Charles Crabtree, Craig Hinshaw, William Rasner, and Past Imperial Potentate John Cinotto and current Divan members Colonels Arthur Borton and Carl Culmann. Representing various Shriners hospital boards are Colonels Arthur Borton, Charles Crabtree, Craig Hinshaw, William Rasner, Dennis Scott, and Robert Wilson. Our current Director of Communications for Murat is Colonel Michael Moxley. Let us not forget one of our own who spends a lot of his time writing about our hospital kids and their stories, Past Recorder and Past Chairman of our Chicago Hospital Board, Colonel Gordon Husk.

Happy 25th anniversary to the Murat Kentucky Colonels Shrine Club and may you have many more.

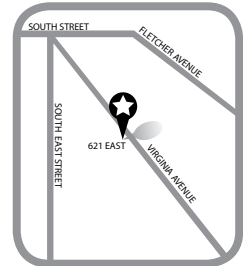

Lastly, all of Shrinedom lost a dedicated Shriner and friend with the passing of Craig Hinshaw. Please keep his family in your thoughts and prayers.

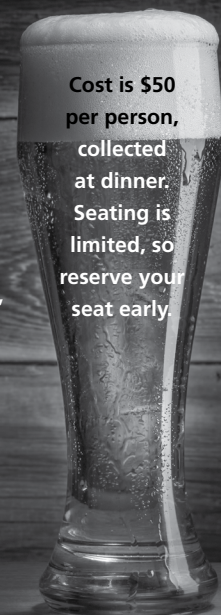
